


Wordy Challenge!

these letters.


The only rule is that they must all contain the letter P. We found 25! Can you beat that?



Match the eggs!

As we get closer to Summer, birds will start to find mates or strengthen their bonds with an existing one. Once they have found a suitable nesting place, they get down to the important task of laying and incubating their eggs. Barns Owls lay one egg every two days and usually produce four to five eggs in total.

Puzzle time!

There are six nests all with four eggs in. Can you find which two nests have their eggs arranged the same? You'll need good observational skills for this one!



Owl Pancakes!

Adult supervision needed

Have a go at making these scrummy owl pancakes and amaze your family with your culinary skills.

Ingredients:

- 1 1/2 cups of plain flour
- 3 1/2 tsp baking powder
- 1 tsp salt
- 1 tbsp white sugar
- 1 1/4 cup of milk
- 1 egg

Fruit for decoration (we used kiwi, strawberries and grapes)



Making the batter:

- 1. In a large bowl sift the flour, baking powder, salt and sugar
- 2. Make a well in the centre and pour in the milk and egg.
- Mix together well.
- 4. In a hot frying pan get an adult to help you cook as many pancakes as you like, but make sure you end up with one slightly smaller than the other to make your owl.

Creating your masterpiece:

- 5. Peel and slice kiwi and use for the eyes.
- 6. Slice strawberries for the feathers, beak, and wings.
- 7. Slice grapes for the toes and feathers on the side of its head.
- 8. Don't forget to take a picture of your creation before tucking in enjoy!


